

Parliament Chairman Papuashvili Criticizes EU Ambassador's Call for Judicial Integrity Check in Georgia

Papuashvili noted that such statements over the past two years have led to an 'attack' against Georgian justice and specific judges.

"Yesterday, I was surprised by the statement of the acting ambassador regarding Vetting. I would have expected him to at least express his regret that the EU embassy was an instrument of a fake attack on Georgian justice. In fact, for two years, because of such statements, Georgian justice and specific judges have been the object of attack.

Yesterday, instead of hearing from the current ambassador of the European Union regret that the statement of the former ambassador at the time misled the public, was unfair to specific judges, was not based on facts, and was discrediting Georgian justice, we hear that it turns out that there is a need to check the integrity of Georgian judges. If someone's integrity is to be tested, it is our NGOs sector," said Papuashvili.

The Chairman reiterated that checking judges' integrity is unnecessary and emphasized that involving foreign citizens in vetting processes is unconstitutional and unacceptable to the Georgian people.

"During the discussion, it was revealed that there is no argument on anyone's side that there are systemic challenges requiring such a radical intervention, and therefore Vetting is not necessary.

Vetting with the participation of foreign citizens is against the constitution and categorically unacceptable for the Georgian people. No one is going to include Polish, Dutch, and Lithuanian experts here. This is unacceptable," said the Parliament Chairman.

Lelo Leader Khazaradze Accuses Georgian Dream Party of Intentionally Fostering Georgia's Economic Dependence on Russia

Mamuka Khazaradze, Lelo party leader, criticized the Georgian Dream party, suggesting that its motives are disguised as Georgian, but in reality, its sole objective is to maintain power. Khazaradze alleged that the party's actions serve as direct Russian propaganda in Georgia. He pointed to examples such as visa-free travel and the scheduling of flights to cities that were not accessible from Tbilisi even during the Soviet Union era.

Lelo's leader emphasized that in the upcoming 2024 elections, the Georgian people's clear preference for European values should be reflected.

"The Georgian people, who have repeatedly expressed their European choice, should reflect this in the 2024 elections.

The Georgian Dream party is disguised with pseudo-Georgian motivations, but in reality, it is driven by only one goal - to stay in power. Its other actions, whether hidden or not, serve as direct Russian propaganda in Georgia. This is evident in policies such as visa-free travel and the scheduling of flights to cities that were not even accessible from Tbilisi during the Soviet Union era.

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visas in the last two years, not to mention the 'Gavrilov Night', nor the so-called Russian law on agents. This is a deliberate policy, and from the outside, we are practically part of the Russian economy because 26,000 Russian companies were registered in Georgia in the last two years, and you cannot name even 100 European companies that were registered here during this period. This is the result," Khazaradze said.

EU appoints new head of its Monitoring Mission in Georgia



On 26 March, the Council of the European Union appointed a new head of the EU Monitoring Mission in Georgia (EUMM Georgia).

Major General Bettina Boughani was appointed from 21 March 2024 until 14 December 2024. She is a commissioned officer of the French National Gendarmerie with extensive experience in international relations and stabilisation missions.

Previously, she held various senior positions within the United Nations and the French Gendarmerie, as well as in the Ministry of the Interior. Most recently she was involved in conflict prevention, mediation, and peacekeeping in sensitive political and security contexts as MINUSMA's Police Commissioner (United Nations Multidimensional Integrated

Stabilisation Mission in Mali). Bettina Boughani will succeed Dimitrios Karabalis.

EUMM Georgia is an unarmed civilian monitoring mission consisting of over 200 monitors from EU member states. It was deployed in October 2008 following the EU-mediated Six Point Agreement of 12 August 2008 and the subsequent agreement on Implementing Measures of 8 September 2008, which put an end to the conflict between Georgia and Russia.

The mission's mandate consists of stabilisation, normalisation and confidence building, as well as reporting to the EU in order to inform European policy-making and thus contribute to the future EU engagement in the region. *(euneighbourseast.eu)*
