MEPs Express Deep Concern Over Draft Law on 'Transparency of Foreign Influence'

EPs David McAllister, LSven Mikser, and Marina Kaljurand issued a joint statement expressing deep concern over the reintroduction of the draft law on "Transparency of Foreign Influence" by the ruling party in Georgia, which they see as an attack on independent media and civil society organizations. According to MEPs, this law contradicts EU values and democratic principles, potentially jeopardizing Georgia's ambitions for EU membership and Euro-Atlantic integration.

The members of the European parliament urged the government and parliament to consider the aspirations of Georgian people and collaborate with both national and international partners to support civil society organizations.

They also expressed alarm over reports of riot police using force to disperse protesters opposing the law, emphasizing the importance of the right to peaceful protest—a right crucial for a country aspiring to EU membership. They called on Georgian leaders to protect freedoms of expression and assembly and to prevent any escalation of violence.

MEPs reaffirmed their support for the Georgian people's European aspirations and reminded the Georgian leadership that they must still implement **European Parliament**

We are deeply concerned by the re-introduction of the draft law on "Transparency of Foreign Influence" by the ruling party in Georgia. This law, which passed its first reading in the Parliament yesterday, is an attack on independent media and civil society organisations. It is incompatible with EU values and democratic principles. It runs against Georgia's ambitions for EU membership and jeopardises the country's Euro-Atlantic integration. We call on the Georgian Government and Parliament not to disappoint the aspirations of the majority of Georgian people and to engage with the national and international partners on ensuring an enabling working environment for civil society organisations.

We are worried about the reports of riot police using force to disperse protesters demonstrating against the controversial draft law. The right to peaceful protests is a fundamental right and needs to be rigorously respected, especially in a country aspiring for the EU membership. Any indiscriminate use of force against peaceful protesters cannot be justified. We call on the Georgian leadership to ensure the protection of freedoms of expression and assembly and to avoid any escalation of violence.

Amnesty International has called for a swift, impartial, and thorough investigation into the use of force by police, insisting on accountability for any unlawful actions. The organization has also reiterated the importance of the right to peaceful assembly, urging the Georgian government to adhere to international human rights obligations.

Furthermore, Amnesty International has renewed its call for the Georgian authorities to abandon the controversial bill "On transparency of foreign influence." The organisation wrote that the bill aims to undermine the freedom of association and unduly restricts and discredits independent civil society organizations and their operations.

"What we witnessed in Tbilisi yesterday was a brutal retribution against people for exercising their right to protest peacefully. The authorities act as if it is their prerogative to decide when people can or cannot protest and deploy riot police to disperse and arbitrarily arrest the protestors using violence. On several occasions, police were seen chasing and hitting fleeing protestors with truncheons, surrounding and beating them mercilessly while on the ground."

"Instead of facilitating a peaceful demonstration, the police have carried out what appears to be a punishment operation. We urge a swift, impartial and thorough investigation into all instances of force used, and accountability for those found responsible of unlawful use of force. We also remind the Georgian authorities that the right to peaceful assembly is fundamental, and the government of Georgia must comply with the country's international human rights obligations.

"Amnesty International also reiterates its call to drop the bill "On transparency of foreign influence," which seeks to restrict the right to freedom of association and is clearly intended to smear and restrict independent civil society organisations and curb their activities," the statement reads.

Special European Council says Ukraine urgently needs air defence systems and other military assistance

On the first day of the Special European Council, taking place in Brussels on 17 and 18 April, EU leaders underlined the need to urgently provide air defence to Ukraine and speed up and intensify the delivery of all the necessary military assistance. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy has joined the Council through video conference.

Recalling its conclusions of March 2024, the European Council reiterated its full unwavering support to Ukraine, its people and its independence, sovereignty and territorial integrity within its internationally recognised borders.

The European Council also strongly condemned Russia's continued air and missile attacks against Ukraine's civilians and civilian and critical infrastructure, including the recent intensified targeting of the energy sector.

The Council said in its conclusions that the EU and its

Member States would intensify the provision of humanitarian and civil protection assistance, including equipment such as power generators and power transformers.

EU leaders also underlined the need to urgently provide air defence to Ukraine and to speed up and intensify the delivery of all the necessary military assistance, including artillery ammunition and missiles. They called on the Council of the European Union, notably at its upcoming meeting, and on Member States to ensure the necessary followup.

EU leaders also welcomed progress on the proposals to direct extraordinary revenues from Russia's frozen assets to benefit Ukraine, and called for their swift adoption.

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
